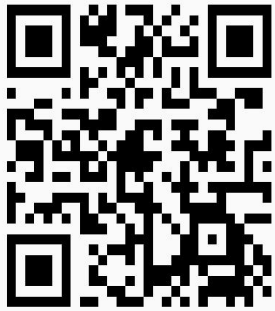

INFORMATION BROCHURE



The Institution:

Government General Degree College, Mangalkote, affiliated to The University of Burdwan, began its humble journey in 2015 with a handful of teachers and support of the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal, with the objective to promote subsidized higher education in the nearby villages. The Institution has earned the recognition of the University Grants Commission, New Delhi, under section 2(f) and 12B of UGC Act of 1956. The first batch of students was admitted in July, 2015, for the academic session 2015-2016. They were offered Three Year B.A. Honours Programmes in English, Bengali, History, Political Science and Sociology, and a B.A. General Programme. The Three Year B.Sc. Honours Programme began in 2016 with the establishment of the Departments of Zoology, Chemistry and Botany. This year according to **New Education Policy-2020**, the mentioned courses in case of **Honours** will be **4 yr** duration and **General courses** will be of **3yr** duration with **subject specific major**. The college has expanded in terms of students and faculty strength over time. Currently the institution has 21 faculty members from different disciplines who are academically inclined and involved in research. Eight faculty members have earned doctoral degree while many others are pursuing doctoral research. Apart from imparting education to the young minds, the institution strives for all round development of its students: intellectual, cognitive, mental and physical, through its best practices. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell takes utmost care in this regard.

Best Practices of the Institution:

An educational institution is responsible for producing academically sound students and responsible citizens. Our best practices aim to achieve this goal. Spirit of nationalism is instilled among the students through the observation of Independence Day and Republic Day. They are made aware of our rich indigenous cultural heritage and political history by celebrating birthdays of freedom fighters and social reformers like Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Rabindranath Tagore, Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar and Raja Ram Mohan Roy. The students are provided opportunities to display their creative and co-curricular skills in cultural programmes, essay competitions, debates, etc. Physical fitness is taken care of by organizing annual sports meet. Our college has sports equipment to allow students to engage in sports in leisure time. The Science departments has built high level infrastructure to carry out research work by getting project grants sanctioned. Science faculty members have also published articles in reputed Scopus indexed international journals. The Women's and Visakha Cell organizes gender sensitization programmes to make students aware about dignity and equality of every individual regardless of gender difference. They emphasize the significance of understanding the uniqueness of women's problems which call for gender-sensitive treatment. The Environmental Awareness Committee generates awareness about environmental concerns and mitigation strategies. The NSS Unit organizes campaigns on social issues like 'Save Water', 'Safe Drive, Save Life', etc. Students are offered the opportunity to gain knowledge beyond books and classrooms through field visits and seminars/webinars/workshops.

Code of Conduct in the College Campus:

Strict discipline is maintained within the college campus. This ensures well-being, safety and inclusion of all students aiming to achieve higher education. Discrimination based on caste, creed, religion, physical or mental ability, and gender or sexual orientation is strictly prohibited. The functioning of two important committees is important in this regard:

a) Anti-ragging Committee and Squad – In order to prevent ragging in the college campus and punish those who perpetrate it, a committee has been formed following the UGC guidelines as per notice no. F 1-16/2007 (CPP-II), April 2009, titled ‘UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009.’

Ragging constitutes one or more of the following acts:

1. Any conduct by any student or students whether by words or spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.
2. Indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any student.
3. Asking any student to do any act which student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of fear, shame, torment or embarrassment, so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
4. Act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturb the regular academic activity of any other student or fresher.
5. Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
6. Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students involved in ragging.
7. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person;
8. Any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, posts, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student;
9. Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student or students over any fresher or any other student.

The college has adopted a *zero-tolerance policy* towards incidents of ragging within the campus. The guiding objectives of *zero-tolerance policy* are:

1. To root out ragging in all forms from the campus by prohibiting and preventing its occurrence.
2. To implement the provisions of UGC regulations on curbing and menace of ragging.
3. To punish those who involve or indulge in ragging.

Punishment:

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence, as established by the anti-ragging committee of the institution, the possible punishment for those found guilty of ragging at the institution level shall be any one or in any combination of the following:

1. Cancellation of admission
2. Suspension from attending classes



3. Withholding/withdrawing of scholarship/fellowship and other benefits
4. Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process
5. Withholding of results
6. Debarring from representing the college in any regional, national or international competition or meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
7. Rustication from the college for a period ranging from 1 to 4 semesters
8. Expulsion from the college and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
9. Fine of Rupees 25000/-
10. Collective punishment: When the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers.

Preventive Measures adopted:

1. The college has hoardings and banners erected in prominent places within the campus to exhort students to prevent or not to indulge in ragging, indicating the names and telephone numbers of faculty members to be contacted in case of ragging.
2. The college has an active anti-ragging committee and anti-ragging squad to ensure that the directives of the Honourable Supreme Court of India and Justice Raghavan Committee recommendations are followed without exception.
3. Anti-ragging affidavits are obtained from every student and parents or guardians as per clause (m&n) of Regulations 6.2.
4. The college organizes anti-ragging awareness and sensitization campaigns to prevent ragging.
5. The college constantly monitors the activities of students during each academic session.

b) Visakha Cell –As per guidelines of UGC and the Supreme Court of India, Visakha Cell has been operative since beginning, whose objective is to spread gender sensitivity and awareness about the incidence of sexual harassment through various sensitization programmes and develop concrete institutional policies to identify the miscreants and protect the victims from social disgrace.

Faculty Development and Research Endeavours of the Institution:

The institution promotes overall development of the teachers by encouraging them to participate in professional development programmes, short term courses and workshops. Active research is stimulated by motivating teachers to apply for funded projects, and present and publish their findings in national and international seminars and publications. Department of Chemistry is also registered for offering Ph. D. guidance under The University of Burdwan.

Motto and Future Plans:

Inclusivity, catering to students' diversity and all round development of students are the goals of the institution. Towards this end, the college plans to launch add-on or value-added courses for value addition to the existing B.A. Honours and General, and B.Sc. Honours programmes, and communication skill development courses from the current academic session. A mentor-mentee programme is also being considered to help students overcome academic stress, psychological crises and develop strong inter-personal relationships with teachers. The COVID pandemic has highlighted the importance of online teaching-learning and the necessity to inculcating e-skills among teachers and students. Teachers are being encouraged to participate in e-skill development courses to offer best guidance to students in times of need. The students are and will always be the priority of the institution.

Academic Discipline:

1. According to the guidelines framed by the University of Burdwan, a student will have to attend at least 75% of the classes to appear as a regular student in the Final Examination.
2. Students having less than 75% attendance but above 60% will be declared NON-COLLEGIATE. However, they will be allowed to appear in the Final Examination with a fine specified by the college.

3. Students are expected to pay respect and extend co-operation to teaching and non-teaching staff.
4. Students should keep the college campus clean.
5. Students must not loiter in the verandah or the corridors outside classrooms while classes are held.
6. Every student should bring his/her identity card without fail while coming to the college and present it when required.
7. Students are directed to go through the notice board and college website regularly.
